Copley's Winter Sale— Auction To Showcase Four Collections Of Bird Carvings

CHARLESTON, S.C. — On Friday and Saturday, February 14-15, Copley Fine Art Auctions will make its annual sojourn to the Southeastern Wildlife Expo (SEWE) with its Winter Sale 2020. The sale will offer the opportunity to see and take home world-class paintings and bird carvings. The auction will be conducted at the Charleston Marriott at SEWE's bustling riverfront venue.

Returning to South Carolina for the sixth year in a row, this year's sale will showcase four collections of bird carvings: the Dr Peter J. Muller Jr collection of American bird decoys, Session II of the Dr Morton D. Kramer collection, decoys from the William J. Butler Jr estate and a collection of carvings by A. Elmer Crowell.

Muller is known for assembling one of the very first curated collections of premier American bird decoys. He was introduced to the field in the 1960s and his early mentor was William J. Mackey Jr, the author of the seminal book American Bird Decoys. After the collector's sudden passing in 1973, Muller participated in all eight of the Mackey auction sessions, acquiring many of his iconic works. Following this summer's release of the A. Elmer Crowell book and Harmon collection catalog, Copley's decoy specialists, Stephen B. O'Brien Jr, Chelsie Olney and Colin S. McNair, have been writing a dedicated Muller collection catalog in addition to the main Winter Sale catalog. The standalone Muller collection catalog will feature several Mackey collection stars, several of which are expected to bring six figures, including a swan by Charles Birch (1867-1956), carved circa 1920; a rare hooded merganser pair, circa 1935, by Chincoteague Islander Ira D. Hudson (1873-1949); a longtailed drake by Harry V. Shourds (1861-1920), a rare Mason Decoy Factory longtailed drake; and a Joseph Lin-

coln (1859-1938) swimming Canada goose.

This year's sale catalog will feature a "Dust-Jacket" yellowlegs by A. Elmer Crowell (1862-1952), carved circa 1910 (\$100/150,000). The term "dust jacket" was coined by collectors because carvings from these early rigs were chosen for the covers of William J. Mackey Jr's American Bird Decoys and John and Shirley Delph's New England Decoys.

Another top New England lot will be a Charles Safford (1877-1957) Canada goose from the personal maker's rig (\$30/50,000). This decoy is related to the Safford sleeping goose. One more decoy bringing together iconic form and important provenance is the feeding yellowlegs by Fred Nichols (1854-1924), which hails from the Dr James M. McCleery collection (\$65/85,000).

The paintings are led by a rare watercolor depiction of western pheasant hunting by noted sporting artist Ogden M. (1905-1983)Pleissner (\$40/60,000). The sale will also feature dog art, perfect for the SEWE crowd, including an atmospheric Percival Rosseau (1859-1937) oil portrait depict-ing a setter and pointer (\$30/50,000) and a masterwork by Gustav Muss-Arnolt (1858-

1927) of two setters (\$16/24,000). Also set to cross the block is a significant work featuring an English springer spaniel with a pheasant by Thomas Blinks (1860-1912), an English artist who flourished Victorian era during the (\$18/24,000). Watercolors by Edmund H. Osthaus (1858-1928) and Arthur Wardle (1864-1949) round out the offering of paintings depicting working dogs.

Leading the works on paper slated for the sale is a bound set of seven octavo volumes of Birds of America by John James Audubon (1785-1851)

joined with the three Quadrupeds of North America volumes, which the famed artist put together with his son John and Dr John Bachman of Charleston, S.C. (\$30/50,000).

Copley will offer items from the estate of Alfred F. King III. King was the owner of the Sportsman's Edge gallery in New York City for many years. Works from his collection include two drawings and an acrylic by Bob Kuhn (1920-2007) and paintings by fatherson wildlife artists Tom (1926-2000) and Greg Beecham (b 1954).

Exemplary works by sporting

"Dust-Jacket" yellowlegs by A. Elmer Crowell (1862-1952) art masters include paintings and works on paper by Frank W. Benson (1862-1951), Richard E. Bishop (1887-1975), David Hagerbaumer (1921-2014), Aiden Lassell Ripley (1896-1969), William Goadby Lawrence (1913-2002) Carl Rungius (1869-1959), Wilhelm Kuhnert (1865-1926) Ken Carlson (b 1937) and David A.

Maass (b 1929). Additionally, six bronzes by contemporary sculptor Walter Matia will be available, including "Curlew Pair" (\$1/1,500) and a pair of avocets, which was the artist's first sculpture (\$1/1,500). Two works by rising Dutch artist Ewoud de Groot, one depicting a curlew and the other a group of oystercatchers, are included (\$8/12,000). Further contemporary artists included in the sale are Chet Reneson, Luke Frazier, Kent Ullberg, John Kobald, Mike Stidham, Rod Serbousek, and Thomas Aquinas Daly, among others.

Items will be available to preview on Friday, February 14, from 3 to 5 pm and Saturday, February 15, from 8:30 to 10 am. The live auction will begin at 10 am on February 15.
